*"They used the long layover to explore the city for a few hours."*

Fatigue and disorientation caused by travelling across time zones.

*"It took her three days to recover from jet lag after the long-haul flight."*

Travelling a long distance, especially by air.

*"Long-haul flights require extra preparation to stay comfortable."*
